Seamoor, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Water Safety Sea Serpent, is a friendly serpent that likes to talk to kids of all ages about the importance of wearing a life jacket or personal floatation device while on or near the water. Often times you can find Seamoor at St. Paul District parks in North Dakota, Minnesota or Wisconsin. He has even been known to attend baseball games and is a big fan of the state fair. He likes to travel with a few of his park ranger friends and talk about the importance of water safety.

Regardless of the location where you might find Seamoor, be sure to stop by and tell him how you practice water safety. If you're lucky, his park ranger friends might even give you a prize.

Seamoor was created by Robotronics, Inc., a public safety robot manufacturer in Utah. In 2002, Kawasaki Motors Corporation commissioned Robotronics to create a personal watercraft robot to be used to teach the public about personal watercraft safety. Robotronics had previously created a boating safety robot, but this was the first to focus on personal watercraft safety. The fully interactive, remote controlled Seamoor

the Water Safety Sea Serpent was the result of this partnership. Seamoor's personal watercraft can 'drive' around hard floors. He can also move his head, blink his eyes and 'hear' and 'speak' directly to the public. He even likes to have some fun every now and then by spraying water at his friends.
