Both entities have shared responsibilities for maintaining the dam structures, which maintains the pool at the required levels, as well as passing flood flows when the Mississippi River is flowing around 50,000 cfs of higher. The dam structures are not only essential for maintaining the proper elevations for hydro generation, but it also serves upstream customers like the City of Minneapolis Water at the upstream end of the reservoir. Xcel Energy has serious concerns regarding the disposition study and the potential impacts it may have upon the future operation of the project. Xcel Energy has determined that the current discharge capacity of the dam is dependent on the flood control tainter gate in the lock. Without it, the project does not meet federal requirements.
