Restructuring Work Group meets here, briefs Zirschky Group supports concept of 'powering down' decisions and approvals

The latest effort at restructuring the Corps took place at the St. Paul District office the first week of August.

For three days, eight employees from around the Corps reviewed the role statement recommendations submitted the Headquarter's Restructuring Task Force by districts and divisions. The work group, led by Paul Seguin, a member of the Corps Restructuring Task Force at Corps Headquarters (USACE), represented both divisions and districts and a variety of functional areas. (Note: Seguin worked in the district's Planning Division in the 70s and early 80s)

Reviewing role statements

Their task was a formidable one. They would review more than 200 role statements divided into 13 functional matrices which came out of the June Restructuring Conference in Washington, D.C. They would also consider hundreds of individual recommendations from field units which added to, deleted, or modified those role statements.

After three days and several long nights, the work group briefed Dr. John H. Zirschky, acting assistant secretary of the Army for civil works (ASA/CW), and Maj. Gen. Stanley Genega, director of civil works at USACE, on August 5 in St. Paul.

According to Seguin, the work group did not make any dramatic changes

in the field recommendations. Rather, the work group continued the work started at the June Restructuring Conference in Washington, D.C. "In general, the group supported the concept of powering down decisions and approvals" to the lowest level appropriate for each issue, he said.

Powering down

A good example of that powering down was the issue of where policy and technical review should occur. "The group reached a consensus that technical review should only occur at the district level. Policy review should only occur at the level that has approval authority," Seguin explained.

A new set of matrices, based on the work group's recommendations, was distributed to divisions and districts by Corpsmail on August 15. According to Genega's cover-letter, he and Zirschky will continue to review the work group's recommendations and distribute a revised draft to members of Congress soon. "Later this fall, we intend to present a final draft version of the roles matrix to the decision-makers (Secretary West, other members of the Army Secretariat, and LTG Williams) for approval," Genega wrote.

The August work group was drawn primarily from participants in the June Restructuring Conference. In addition to Seguin, the group included Jim Blencher, Rock Island District; Lenny Kotkiewicz, North Atlantic Division; Gail Mazzola, North Central Division; Roy Smith, Vicksburg District; Susan Smith, Vicksburg District; Bill Willis, Detroit District; Ruth Villalobos, Los Angeles District; and Myron Yuschishin, Savannah District.

Adamski honored

Sustained excellence

Adamski has excelled in contract law, litigation support, environmental and regulatory matters, fiscal law, and labor and personnel law, the award citation said.

Adamski first joined the Corps in 1985 as a legal clerk. In 1990 he distinguished himself as Civil Servant of the Year and earned the Commander's Award for EEO achievement in eliminating barriers for the handicapped.

Taggatz honored

Harold Taggatz, deputy chief of the Construction-Operations Division, received the Superior Civilian

meeting with employees in St. Paul.

The award recognizes his exceptional performance and leadership as chairman of the Performance Measurement and Data Management Task Group of the Operations and Maintenance Program Improvement Implementation Committee — a committee with a Corps-wide mission.

Performance measurement

He was instrumental in developing a performance measurement concept for the Corps-wide Operations and Maintenance organization that could institute a cultural change. The award also recognizes his leadership in developing a plan for an enhanced data management system to support that change.

These measures will enhance the management and operation of Corps projects into the 21st century. His performance has set a record for achievement for others, the award citation said. Taggatz has been with the St. Paul District nearly 32 years.

Zirschky: Shorten project process, prepare for FTE cuts

In remarks to St. Paul District employees at a town meeting on August 5, Dr. John Zirschky, the acting assistant secretary of the Army for civil works, urged Corps employees to shorten the product development process and to prepare for cuts in full-time-equivalents (FTEs). He reiterated that government-wide personnel reductions are driving Corps-wide FTE cuts of 3,401.

Rebuild customer support

According to Zirschky, 31 percent of the Corps' planning, engineering and design (PED) work is behind schedule or over budget. With this in mind, Zirschky is visiting districts with a call to rebuild customer support through improved execution and performance.

Zirschky also hopes to eliminate and reduce layers of review in order to shorten the project review process.

To support quicker reviews, Headquarters is considering delegating more authority to divisions and districts — to districts for technical review and to the lowest appropriate level for policy review.

He recalled Continuing Authorities projects where review time had been shortened from 187 days to 83 days; and Section 14 projects which were shortened from over three years to 44 days.

Zirschky's visit to the district coincided with the Restructuring Task Force (see page 4). He also toured the Dredge Thompson.

From supplies to travel orders Logistics makes user-friendly changes in service

Suggestions from the Army Communities of Excellence program and customer feedback have prompted some user-friendly changes in Logistics Management (LM).

Olivia Vavreck, chief of LM, initiated the changes in response to customer comments.

Customer comments

"I personally read all employee input and suggestions for improvement," said Vavreck. "The comments indicated a necessity for change in LM in order to meet customer needs."

Toward that end, LM has changed supply room procedures to facilitate emergency orders. LM staff now deliver supplies on a daily basis.

LM re-wrote the supply catalog, which lists everything from adding machine tape to twine, in easier to understand language. LM even borrowed an idea from its counterparts at the St. Louis District—network software to allow the ordering of supplies electronically, resulting in a faster turnaround for the customer. (Information Management is evaluating the software for use in this district.)

Improvements in five areas

In the 10 months since the district moved into its new office, LM has improved service to five areas travel and transportation, property, supplies, fleet management, and facilities and space. Examples abound. The processing of travel orders are now more simple, making it easier for the traveler. A certification of tax exempt status now accompanies travel orders. LM initiated regulatory changes in the Property Book, making it easier for hand receipt holders to reconcile their property inventories.

Working with building owner

Many changes needed cooperation with the building's owner and management company.

The owner has purchased and installed a bicycle rack in a secure area of the garage. Also, the owner has agreed to purchase and install shelves in the rest rooms. (Shelves

for planners and briefcases was an employee suggestion which LM approved last May.)

LM is also working with the building manager and parking contractor to provide designated parking for all Corps vehicles. This includes three parking spaces for field personnel. All of these spaces will be marked. LM has approved and is in the process of issuing building security access cards to field locations.

"LM recognizes the need for respectful relationships with our customers and the need to be a vital part of the district team. Our goal is to be positive, helpful, and supportive," said Vavreck.

TAQ to debut

St. Paul District employees will get their first formal introduction to Total Army Quality (TAQ) at a town-hall meeting scheduled for October 3 in the First Trust Building's Jerome Hill Theater. Al Geisen, the district's TAQ coordinator, will brief district office employees.

"The district will have an opportunity to learn about TAQ implementation at the town meeting," said Geisen. "TAQ is founded on the principles of total quality management. Its goal is to improve the processes we work in."

The processes are the people, equipment, materials, input, methods, and the environment that work together to produce a product or service.

Geisen's presentation will define TAQ, describe its history, outline the principles, show how TAQ works, highlight the benefits, explain why the district is adopting TAQ, and lay out the district's TAQ plan.

Centennial of service at Fountain City

Nearly 200 people attended the Fountain City Service Base open house (photo at right) on August 13 to commemorate 100 years of service. The service base offered tours and displays to the public for the event. At left, Jack Grossell, the maintenance foreman at the service base, helps answer questions.
